#### 1.0 INTRODUCTION

# 1.1 Site Background

1.1.1 Archaeology South-East (ASE), a division of the Centre for Applied Archaeology (CAA) at the Institute of Archaeology (IoA), University College London (UCL), was commissioned by Paul Giles to undertake an archaeological watching brief during the groundworks associated with the building of a new extension at White House Farm, Higham, Kent (NGR TQ 7180 7225; Figure 1).

# 1.2 Topography and Geology

- 1.2.1 The farm house is located on the north side of Higham Hill with views over the marshes and the River Thames to the north. The ground slopes from south to north.
- 1.2.2 According to the British Geological Survey 1:50,000 map (Sheet 272, Chatham) the solid geology of the site is Upper Chalk.

## 1.3 Planning Background

- 1.3.1 The redevelopment consists of the construction of a two storey extension on the northeast corner of the house to provide an enlarged lounge at ground floor level, with a bedroom and ensuite shower room, together with previously approved minor alterations.
- 1.3.2 Gravesham Borough Council has a condition for an archaeological watching brief to be carried out on the planning consent for the development:
  - No development shall take place until the applicant, or their agents or successors in title, has secured the implementation of a watching brief to be undertaken by an archaeologist approved by the Local Planning Authority so that the excavation is observed and items of interest and finds are recorded. The watching brief shall be in accordance with a written programme and specification which has been submitted to and approved by the Local Planning Authority.
- 1.3.3 Accordingly, the Heritage Conservation Group at Kent County Council produced a specification for the work (HCGKCC 2012) and all work was carried out in accordance with this and the relevant Standards and Guidance of the Institute of Field Archaeologists (IFA 2008).
- 1.3.4 A separate condition was also added for building recording work and has been reported on in a previous report (ASE 2011).

# 1.4 Aims and Objectives

1.4.1 The objectives of the archaeological watching brief were to contribute to heritage knowledge of the area through the recording of any archaeological remains exposed as a result of excavations in connection with the groundworks. Particular attention was to be made to the character, height below ground level, condition, date and significance of the deposits.

## 1.5 Scope of the report

- 1.5.1 This report details the results of an archaeological watching brief undertaken on the 2<sup>nd</sup> July by Giles Dawkes. The historic building recording work is reported on separately (*ibid*.).
- 1.5.2 The fieldwork was managed by Andy Leonard (Project Manager) and the post-excavation analysis was managed by Jim Stevenson (Project Manager).

## 2.0 ARCHAEOLOGICAL BACKGROUND

- 2.1 The application site lies within an area of Bronze Age and Roman potential, with cropmarks showing possible Bronze Age ring ditches in the area. Romano-British cremation burials have been discovered at Peartree Lane, Shorne (KCC 2012, 1).
- 2.2 The area around Higham is also well-known as a Roman pottery production centre of national importance. Recent archaeological work by ASE has also identified Bronze Age, Early Anglo-Saxon and medieval occupation at Cliffe Woods to the north-east (Dawkes forthcoming).

#### 3.0 ARCHAEOLOGICAL METHODOLOGY

# 3.1 Methodology

- 3.1.1 The groundworks were undertaken by a mechanical 360° tracked excavator fitted with a toothless bucket. All revealed surfaces were cleaned and inspected. The main contractor allowed the archaeological contractor reasonable time and resources to undertake inspection and/or recording as required.
- 3.1.2 The archaeological work was carried out in accordance with the specification (KCC 2011) and the relevant Standards and Guidance of the Institute of Field Archaeologists (IFA 2008).
- 3.1.3 The excavation of new foundation trenches and a pad foundation (Figure 2) were monitored on the 2<sup>nd</sup> July.

#### 3.2 Site archive

3.2.1 The site archive is currently held at the offices of ASE and will be deposited with Maidstone Museum in due course. The contents of the archive are tabulated below (Table 1).

#### 4.0 RESULTS

(Figure 3)

- 4.1 The natural chalk [003] was encountered at 0.5m below ground level at approximately 36.2m OD in both the foundation trenches and the pad foundations.
- 4.2 Overlying the natural was brown silt with frequent modern brick rubble fragments [002] up to 0.3m thick and topsoil [001].
- 4.3 No archaeological features or finds were exposed during the watching brief.

#### 5.0 DISCUSSION

5.1 The watching brief did not identify any archaeological deposits or finds. The area of the watching brief seems to have been recently disturbed, more than likely during the 1980s renovations to the house.






