#### Abstract

Archaeology South-East observed groundworks associated with the installation of a pumping station and attendant pipe on land at Twymans Mill, Faversham, undertaken in January 2008. No archaeological features were identified; overburden of sand and gravel was observed to a depth of 0.10m followed by a subsoil deposit of mid-brown silty clay with moderate post medieval brick inclusions.

#### 1.0 INTRODUCTION

## 1.1 Site Background

1.1.1 Archaeology South-East were commissioned by Four Delivery Ltd to undertake a watching brief on the installation of a pumping station and associated pipe at Twymans Mill at the north end of Tanners Street, Faversham, Kent (Figure 1) (NGR 601147 161478).

# 1.2 Geology and Topography

1.2.1 The underlying geology on site is listed as Upper Chalk in the British Geological Survey; however, alluvium and Head Brickearth cappings have been recorded to the east and west of site.

## 1.3 Planning Background

1.3.1 The Heritage Conservation Group at Kent County Council (KCC) advised that archaeological monitoring would be necessary during the works due to the known archaeological potential of the area.

## 1.4 Aims and Objectives

- 1.4.1 The general aim of the work was to record any archaeological remains exposed as part of the works and to detail the character, height below ground level, condition, date and significance of the deposits.
- 1.4.2 The particular aims as outlined in the specification (KCC 2007) are to:
- Identify any remains connected with Saxon or medieval settlement or creekside activity.
- Establish the existing archaeological impact in the area from the creation of modern residential use.

# 1.5 Scope of Report

1.5.1 This report represents the findings of the archaeological observations of January 2008.

#### 2.0 ARCHAEOLOGICAL BACKGROUND

- 2.1 The archaeological background of the site is taken from the specification (KCC 2007) and reproduced here with due acknowledgement.
- 2.2 The site is located on the edge of the historic core of medieval Faversham and of the likely Saxon settlement, just north of what may have been the contemporary market place. The bridge to the west of the site is thought to be the site of an early ford across Faversham Creek, as several Saxon roads converge there.
- 2.3 During the medieval and post medieval period a number of gunpowder mills were located around the creek.
- 2.4 The mill itself appears to have been a wool warehouse in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries before conversion into residential use.
- 2.5 The SMR for Kent County Council details 30 listed buildings within a 500m radius of the site of which 18 are post medieval and 12 are either certainly or probably medieval in origin. Table 1 lists the remaining SMR entries for the area.

## 3.0 ARCHAEOLOGICAL METHODOLOGY

3.1 An archaeologist observed the ground works after the holes had been excavated.

## 4.0 RESULTS

4.1 A deposit of dark brown silty clay subsoil was encountered at a depth of 0.10m below the surface which contained a moderate amount of post medieval brick rubble. Overlying this deposit was an overburden of modern sand and gravel deposits of 0.10m thickness. No archaeological finds or features were identified.

#### 5.0 CONCLUSION

5.1 No evidence was observed of Saxon or medieval activity on site. The initial 0.40m of subsoil appeared to be greatly disturbed by post-medieval activity with a moderate amount of building rubble identified within the subsoil. No archaeological features were observed.




